



More recently, Don spearheaded an employee volunteer litter cleanup crew, an effort that has netted thousands of pounds of trash. The most impactful effort has been at Mobile's Maple Street tributary where Don and several Thompson Engineering employees, along with volunteers from the Mobile Bay National Estuary Program, Partners for Environmental Progress and the University of South Alabama gathered in November 2016 to tackle the tributary's trash problem by kayak and by foot along the shore. The initial cleanup netted 200 bags of trash and 12 tires. A subsequent cleanup in March resulted in even more trash collected.



The Three Mile Creek Greenway is one component of turning the Creek


Director's Report- NFWF Funding Amendment

Government Networks Committee



- Focused on determining priorities, needs, and barriers facing local governments with the goal of increasing capacity to manage and maintain coastal environmental resources.
- A regulatory review across Mobile and Baldwin counties is underway, and will be used to develop a platform of changes needed to manage coastal resources.



Community Action Committee



- Group met August 16, 2017. Roundtable discussion to address strengths and frustrations for 2018 focus.
- Coastal Alabama trainers have trained ~107 and recertified ~12 monitors since July. Fowl River group was recertified. Bon Secour program established in June.
- Conservation Corps conducted a seven week bacteria blitz at five sites in TMC and TSB.
- Presented program update at the Alabama Water Resources Conference 9/7.
- Submitted proposal for a Gulf Star grant 9/15. Would provide substantial resources to enhance citizen monitoring program.

MBNEP continues to reimburse groups for monitoring supplies.



Business Resources Committee



\$488,711 US EPA Gulf of Mexico Program Grant Award to MBNEP to Implement Comprehensive Trash Strategy in Three Mile Creek Watershed

Phase I

- Deploy 10 Litter Gitters in Three Mile Creek.
- Engage **10 workers** to remove legacy trash from areas not suitable for community volunteers.
- Partner with Mobile Baykeeper's SWAMP program at Vigor to provide **volunteers for EPA pilot trash assessment.**

Phase II

- BRC to plan and implement an alternative packaging incentive plan- Target 5 businesses identified as trash sources, to increase use of more environmentally-friendly alternatives.
- Conduct at least **one outreach event** to raise awareness and encourage behavioral changes towards Creating a Clean Water Future.



Community Resources Committee



- Next meeting will be held on November
 29th
- The CRC approved the workplan tasks they would complete by Fiscal Year 2018.
 - Increase awareness of coastal resources supporting what people value about living in coastal Alabama.
 - Advocate for environmental issues addressed in the CCMP
 - Build capacity of grassroots groups to ensure citizen involvement in cresting more resilient and environmentally responsible communities.
