- **1. Introductions/Call to Order:** The meeting was called to order at 2:30 pm. The group did a quick round of introductions.
- 2. Approval of Minutes: Commissioner Chris Blankenship asked for comments or revisions to the minutes from the March 22, 2024, meeting. Hearing no remarks, Mr. Byrne made a motion to approve, and Commissioner Ludgood seconded the motion.

3. Directors Report:

• Approval of Section 320 EPA Workplan: Ms. Swann gave a detailed overview and update of the projects and budgets within the FY 2025 EPA Section 320 Work Plan (attached). The \$850,000 funding requires 100% in matched dollars, which come from State, local governments, and other grant funds available for match. Our State and local budget is \$542,600 for the fiscal year 2025, which includes \$125,000 from the State of Alabama, \$90,000 from ADCNR, \$75,000 from both Baldwin and Mobile counties, and ten municipalities in the two counties. Any remaining funds needed are generated from in-kind contributions, which include volunteer labor hours, unrecovered indirect costs from DISL, use of city-owned machinery, the value of land donated for conservation purposes, and private donations to cover expenses incurred for events and activities carried out by local grassroots organizations and sponsored by MBNEP. The following are our projections for fiscal year 2025 match:

Overall, key areas of focus for the coming year will center around investigation of efficient coastal monitoring protocols and new practices for pathogen source detection, strategic implementation of recommendations in watershed management plans, investing in private sector efforts to advance resilience, and community outreach to engage as many different constituencies as possible in shaping the CCMP for 2025-2030.
